Local anesthetic agents in dentistry. In dentistry, the most commonly used local anesthetic is lidocaine (also called xylocaine or lignocaine). Lidocaine's half-life in the body is about 1.5–2 hours. As of 2018, Lidocaine is most commonly used in dental procedures to numb the area around a tooth. In root canal treatment, for example, more Lidocaine is required than for a simple filling

What is Dental Anesthesia? To help alleviate pain and discomfort before dental surgery, your dentist or dental hygienist (in some states) may administer dental anesthesia. Anesthesia is a safe pain control mechanism that eliminates negative sensations in a specific area without the loss of consciousness (except general anesthesia).

Many dental patients are geriatric, therefore a thorough physical exam, pre-operative blood work, and close anesthetic monitoring are imperative. Because of the use of water coolant for dental instruments, particular attention to airway security and prevention of aspiration is required.

Dental work often involves the extraction of teeth or cutting into the oral tissue. Because this can be painful dentists typically use anesthetics to diminish the pain at the time of the operation. Most dentists use local anesthesia, which is the injection of agents that temporarily numb the nerves 1 .

Specially-trained anesthesia professionals (physicians, dentists, or certified nurse anesthetists) will administer medications and monitor your child while a separate dentist or oral surgeon performs the dental procedure or surgery. Anesthesia or Sedation for Your Child's Dental Work ...

Local Anesthesia: All surgical cases are performed with local anesthetic (also known as "Novocain") regardless of whether any type of sedation is chosen. Local anesthetic numbs your tooth, jawbone, and gums. Intravenous Sedation ("IV sedation/ Twilight Sleep/ Conscious sedation"): IV sedation enables you to feel relaxed and comfortable throughout the surgery.

In order to offer general anesthesia during in-office procedures, your oral surgeon has: Received hospital-based anesthesia training for a minimum of 3 months; Undertaken an in-office assessment by an examiner from the state dental board; Performed an oral surgery using general anesthesia with examiner's oversight

Local anesthesia is a numbing medication that is injected directly into the area that is about to be treated, usually the gums around an affected tooth. Local anesthesia is typically used during a minor surgery that can be done quickly, such as a cavity filling. You remain conscious during the dental procedure and won't feel pain.

That said, anesthesia for oral surgery has been proven over and over to be safe. According to Joel Weaver, DDS, Ph.D., an oral and maxillofacial surgeon in Columbus, OH, and former professor and director of anesthesiology at Ohio State University College of Dentistry, one out of 350,000 patients sedated for dentistry die each year.
