He led the 1950 French Annapurna expedition that first climbed a peak over 8000m, Annapurna, in 1950, and reached the summit with Louis Lachenal. Upon his return, he wrote a best-selling book about the expedition

The mountain is in Nepal and the government had given permission for the expedition, the first time it had permitted mountaineering in over a century.

The first 8,000 m peak to be climbed was the Annapurna I, three years earlier in 1950, by a French expedition including Maurice Herzog, Lionel Terray, Gaston Rébuffat, Jean Crouzy, Marcel Schutz, Jacques Oudot, Francis de Noyelle an cinematographer Marcel Ichac, the only one who had already an Himalayan experience (see 'Karakoram', film of 1936 awarded at Venice Film Festival in 1938).

In 1950, when he was thirty-one years old, Herzog led the French expedition that scaled Annapurna, a giant mountain in the Himalaya range of Nepal. Annapurna is the tenth highest peak in the world. It rises to a height of 26,502 feet, and until the scaling of Mount Everest in 1953, it was the highest mountain ever climbed.
